English Communication for Nursing is an eight-unit book designed to equip nurses who wish to communicate effectively with English-speaking patients with an essential foundation of language. The book features helpful vocabulary and expressions, realistic patient-nurse dialogs that simulate hospital interactions, cultural tips, practice activities, and samples of important forms that patients may encounter in the hospital. The book exposes learners to the necessary vocabulary for nursing, without overwhelming. It integrates CEFR vocabulary with basic medical vocabulary to build dialogs that provide important practice opportunities.

Each unit focuses on a different aspect of medical care, including checking in to a hospital, surgery, medications, pain management, pediatrics, orthopedics, gastroenterology, and cardiology. An appendix provides additional language with dialogs between co-workers within the hospital setting.

English Communication for Nursing provides students with practical nursing vocabulary. It serves as a standalone resource or can be paired with online videos to enhance listening skills. This book empowers nurses to build confidence in speaking English with patients, facilitating the development of effective communication skills.

Warm-Up and Vocabulary

The unit starts with two thought-provoking questions to engage learners with the theme of the unit. Learners then preview the vocabulary for the unit.

Key Expressions

Learners study the key expressions of the unit and practice matching them with relevant responses or questions. This activity has learners start thinking about how this new language can be used.

Hospital Forms

Each unit features a sample form that patients and/or nurses might encounter during a hospital visit. These range from pre-surgery checklists to pain scales to medication information. Learners are invited to discuss their own experiences with using forms.





Videos 1 & 2 and Key Expressions

Learners read and listen to the dialogs of the unit. They then complete a fill-in-the-blank activity with relevant vocabulary and key expressions. Students may read the dialogs aloud with a partner for additional speaking and pronunciation practice.




Students may also access the videos using the instructions on p. 116.

Activities

Each dialog is followed by three kinds of activities: comprehension, role play/discussion, and vocabulary practice. These activities provide valuable opportunities to consolidate understanding and use of the important vocabulary and expressions in the unit.

Students also build confidence through controlled use of the new language.



Unit Review

Each unit ends with a review of the vocabulary and expressions introduced in the unit. Activity types include categorizing, vocabulary use, and speaking practice.

Supplementary Units

The book includes two supplemental units which follow the same format as earlier units. These units provide additional practice through themed dialogs related to hospital equipment and facilities.



blood pressure: the force at which blood flows from your heart around your body *High blood pressure can cause many health problems.*

blood sugar (level): the (amount of) sugars such as glucose which are found in blood *Your blood sugar will be higher immediately after a meal.*

cardiology: the area of medicine that deals with the heart and diseases of the heart *My sister is studying to become a doctor and hopes to specialize in cardiology.*

cell phone number: a series of numbers that provide you access to a person's cell phone *My cell phone number is 345-243-9988*.

chest pain: a feeling of discomfort in the upper front part of your body between your neck and your stomach

If you have chest pain, it is important to see a doctor immediately.

contact person: a person who should be called or emailed on behalf of another person in case of an emergency

cough: the act of forcing air up through your throat with a sudden noise *I had a terrible cough when I had the flu.*

date of birth: the day, month, and year on which you were born *His date of birth is January 6, 1998.*

elevated: higher than normal *My doctor says that my blood pressure is dangerously elevated.*


